

1 Markdown Basics

This document demonstrates the basic features of Markdown.

1.1 Headings

Headings are created using # symbols. More # means smaller headings.

1.1.1 This is a Level 3 Heading

1.1.1.1 This is a Level 4 Heading

1.1.1.1.1 This is a Level 5 Heading

1.1.1.1.1 This is a Level 6 Heading

1.2 Text Formatting

You can make text **bold** using double asterisks or **double underscores**.

You can make text *italic* using single asterisks or *single underscores*.

You can combine them for ***bold and italic*** text.

You can also use ~~strikethrough~~ with double tildes.

1.3 Lists

1.3.1 Unordered Lists

- Item one
- Item two
 - Nested item A
 - Nested item B
- Item three

1.3.2 Ordered Lists

1. First item
2. Second item
 1. Sub-item one
 2. Sub-item two
3. Third item

1.5 Blockquotes

This is a blockquote. It can span multiple lines.

Nested blockquotes are also possible.

1.6 Code

Inline code uses `backticks`.

Code blocks use triple backticks:

```
function hello() {  
  console.log("Hello, World!");  
}
```

1.7 Horizontal Rules

Three or more dashes create a horizontal rule:

Column 1	Column 2	Column 3
Left	Center	Right
Aligned	Aligned	Aligned
Data	Data	Data

1.10 Escaping Characters

Use backslash to escape special characters: `*not italic*` and `#not a heading`.
